The definition is quite simple: low-techs describe smart machines or systems that do not use modern computers or sophisticated technology. They are easy to use, save energy and resources, and they are able to fulfill the needs of people, businesses and communities ... by the way, their performance is often comparable to high-techs. Creativity is endless. A new generation is inventing new processes using handmade, traditional or second-hand material. They are sometimes also inspired by the "slow" movement. These techs are designed to last long and to be easy to repair.

Nowadays, the expansion throughout the world of low-techs is remarkable. Environmentally friendly, they definitely make a difference with great social impact and usability. Emerging countries are very prolific with numerous incredible new machines coming out.

# How about low techs in Vanuatu?

Of course, low-techs are also used in Vanuatu. One of many low-techs available in the archipelago is the crop dryer.

Daniel Wagler, founder of Tuff Stove, and Gilbert Gibson, a genius designer have worked together to develop a new low-tech handy system, sustainable and easy to dry crops. The dryers are made in Vanuatu and use firewood to heat up the air.



Here in Vanuatu, drying crops is not yet a widely spread habit although it is very useful. The benefits:

- Keeping food all year around
- Healthier and cheaper snacks for everyone, especially children
- Extra revenues for families and cooperatives by accessing the huge export market for dried goods
- Smoke-free drying of crops has much higher resell value

# Wanem ia Digital Assets?

New legislation authorizes the trade of digital assets



In the age of the internet and a time of non-stop information overload, keeping up with what's on the cutting edge is no small task. So when it comes to the world of digital assets, it's understandable that a lot can get lost in the mix. Today, however, as Vanuatu introduces new legislation to authorize the trade of digital assets for licensed financial dealers, a clear view of what these are, how they work, and what they could do for you is more important than ever.

# **Breaking things down**

Let's start with the basics. Though the term 'digital asset' itself has many applications—including everything from land deeds to equity to a range of other commodities—the most widely-recognized form these days comes from virtual currencies. You may have heard the buzzword Bitcoin, but there are in fact many virtual currencies (sometimes categorized as 'cryptocurrencies') to choose from. Cryptocurrency simply refers to money which is kept, traded, and managed on digital platforms and the internet. Unlike traditional currencies, cryptocurrencies are attached to computer networks rather than only governments or central banks, which means they can be used anywhere to serve as a form of ready money.

You may wonder, then, how such a form of exchange is kept secure; the answer lies in the technology that virtual currencies utilize: Blockchain. Everyone in the virtual currency economy is tied to a public blockchain ledger, which is a highly-secure and efficient system for recording transactions that minimizes risk of theft or hacking.

And while Bitcoin itself carries a reputation of constant ups and downs, not all digital coins are created equal. Some are designed with the express purpose of stability, whereas others are now being used by government institutions themselves.



Therefore, it's helpful to take a broader view at the digital asset landscape and consider the flexibility, freedom, and ease of use it allows for people from all backgrounds.

# Why it matters for Vanuatu—and for you?

Now that Vanuatu has moved toward formalizing the trade of digital assets by licensed financial dealers, further legislation may create even more opportunities for it to be used in day-to-day life. As such, it's worth taking a look at some solid examples of the real-world advantages that digital assets offer.

Perhaps virtual money's greatest draw is that there is no bank account required to use it. It brings financial services to everyone, an especially important development for those in remote communities. Say you're working on a farm far from an urban center, and regular trips to the bank don't really make sense. Still, you may need fast access to capital for some of life's most important payments, from medical bills to school tuition and everything in between. That's where digital currency comes in.

One worthwhile example of digital currency's tangible benefits comes from a program that took hold in Vanuatu just last year. Following Cyclone Harold, the NGO Oxfam implemented the UnBlocked Cash project, giving residents affected by the natural disaster digital tokens in order to buy essential goods right away. In opting for blockchain-based fund distribution with digital assets, the UnBlocked Cash project cut down on the time it took to get real money into peoples' hands and, further, made the whole process more transparent.

All in all, the role of digital assets in Vanuatu's future goes far beyond just benefiting traders and those with connections in traditional finance. With support from the country's reserve bank, among others, digital currencies are poised to become a tool for all.





# Interview with Milroy Cainton

Adopting and adapting to Digital Economy in Vanuatu during the pandemic period



arlier this year 2021 at Coffee Tree café, a friend talked to me about how the pandemic changes the way people think and do things. He told me that we are now living in the new normal, and its abit hard for everyone to adopt and adapt to certain aspects of doing things in Vanuatu in this era of the new normal. Interestingly, she didn't explain to me what is "digital economy"?

Well, the "new normal' refers to the state of our current time and how we adapted to do the same thing we used to in a different way. So what is "digital economy"? The internet is scattered with thousands of articles and data on digital economy, So I'll simplify it as much as possible. Digital economy basically is the use of ICT or computer technologies that drives everyday online connections by people, small and big businesses, mobile devices, information and data, and the billions of processes over a computer network in Vanuatu and across the globe.

At Malapoa College learning resources and lectures are delivered via video conferencing platforms. E-Commerce courses become a frequent topic of interest for businesses at Vanuatu Chamber of Commerce and Industy (VCC), complimented by V-Lab, an incubator program for entrepreneur that runs e-commerce workshops with various young entrepreneurs. At Vanuatu Post Ltd, their mail systems is now fully integrated with the Customs ASYCUDA system to ensure effective and efficient e-commerce delivery. These are examples of digital transformation that is happening in Vanuatu.

The exact date for the full re-opening of borders is still unknown, there in the mean time, Vanuatu must collectively look at ways to boost its economy using digital platforms and policies that provides for digital transformation at both the public and private sector.

What are your studies about and why did you choose this specialization?

I am an ongoing student at East China University of Political science and law, studying my bachelor in Political science and Public administration. This is my 3rd year of studying my field.

# Do you speak fluently Mandarin now? Can you write it? Or is is still a challenge?


I can speak Mandarin but I am not a fluent speaker, I am still learning everyday.

The fun part about learning a language is there is always a word you don't know about, so you learn something new every day.

This can be challenging sometimes.

Yes, I can write chinese characters, however they are not perfect.





Given that I am from one of the small island nations in the Pacific, I was mind-blown by the modernization and tall buildings in Shanghai.

The "New York" of China has everything available just a click away, the convenience of being able to order food, call a Didi (taxi service like uber in the USA), buy a plane or train tickets, do your shopping from just an app was overwhelming.

The Chinese culture is vast in diversity and each one distincts in their own way.

Nevertheless, the values, their People uphold is almost similar to the values people back home uphold.

# How about the Ni Vanuatu Community?

Ni-Vanuatu community in China is not that big compared to other countries

How many Ni Vanuatu students are there on your campus and are you able to get together often?

We are scattered all over the provinces.

We keep in touch via WeChat, should there be any important notices the Vanuatu Embassy notifies us from there.



Unfortunately, I am the only Ni-Vanuatu student in my University. There are other Ni-Vanuatu students studying in other Universities in Shanghai as well, we do get together sometimes.

# How about the weather and the fashion and the dress code? Is it very different?

Weather in Shanghai is not promising. We get a lot of rainy days during summer and during winter season if lucky enough we get to experience snow for a day or two.

Fashion in Shanghai differs from one person to another, Everyone has their own unique style and they embrace it. These days, you get exposed to a lot of anime fashion on subways or while walking around downtown of Shanghai. Dress code? dress code at workplace is always formal. It is no different. And university students get to wear whichever clothes they are comfortable with.

## Is life affordable?

It depends on what you called affordable. Yes if planing to live in China, you can consider life in china affordable if you have a job that pays you well. I am currently on a scholarship so I rely on it for my living expenses.

## Have you made friends also with Chinese people or other communities on the campus?

Yes, I have made friends with incredible people in China, Some are from other countries around the world. We get to know each other and exchange knowledge about our cultures as well as good food recipes.



# Are they curious about Vanuatu?

Common question with individuals here while conversing is "where are you from" some automatically assume "Africa".

Some do not know where Vanuatu is or if it is even a country at all. So, we have to explain and show few pictures of our beautiful islands, Vanuatu.

They are very curious about Vanuatu and want to come for a visit.

## Now that the vaccination is spreading how do you see the future post covid?

The future is uncertain, being optimistic is all i can do right now.

# What are your plans when you return to Vanuatu? What is your professional project and also on a more personal side the first place you want to go to?

Yes, I have plans about returning to Vanuatu.

One of my professional project is to start a little private business in the agriculture industry. It does not link up with my professional or my field of study but my papa has always inspired me in the farming system.

# Great success for the Media Awards



nitially, in 1992-1993 the association started as the "Press Klab blong Vanuatu" which brings together journalists from Vanuatu. Up until 1997, a well-known Ni-Vanuatu journalist, Mr. Harold Obed who was one of the main people behind the work of the journalists in Vanuatu, started to discuss the creation of a media association here in Vanuatu. Before the creation of an association, the main issue was to draft a constitution. Therefore a working committee was created in order to develop the media constitution of Vanuatu.

Mr. Harold Obed, Vice President of the committee was at that time working hand in hand with President of the committee, Mr Patrick Decloitre, a French journalist who had lived and worked in Vanuatu in the year 90's.

Thanks to their work and collecting information based on numerous constitutions from National Media Associations in the Pacific Region, a draft of the first constitution of the Media Association was finally delivered under the leadership of late Jonas Cullwick.

In 2006, the Media Association of Vanuatu (MAV) was finally launched with its own constitution, and then later on followed by the creation of the media code of ethics.

The National Media Awards and Gala Dinner will become the most prestigious awards night in Vanuatu.

The Awards are established to recognise "creative and courageous acts of journalism that seek out the truth and give new insight to an issue". MAV Awards aims to foster excellence, independence, innovation and originality in storytelling and distinctive reporting.

It will push for research and investigations, well-crafted and innovative presentations, news-breaking single stories and engaging, entertaining and/or informative reporting.

All entries must have been published, broadcast or televised in over the last 12 months between May 2020 and May 2021.

# "Alter Ego" a beautiful animation inspirated by Vanuatu

Espresso asked the Alter Ego team to tell us more about them and the animation. They very nicely came back to us.

his project was born following a documentary watched by Mahalia Ratabouil about the unfortunately too little-known worldwide, rite of Nagol taking place on the island of Pentecost. She was the one who created the very first lines of the original screenplay. When it was selected by our teachers during our 3rd year of study at ESMA, they then formed a team of 6 students to make the short film. This is where the Alter Ego team was born, made up of Fanny Clause, Terence Farlot, Mateo Nicolas, Mahalia Ratabouil, Zoé Saumade and Paméla Theil. Once the team was built, we reshaped the storyline together with the help of our teachers and started creating the first character and environment designs. We even created a model of Tanua Island, a fictional island that could have existed in the Vanuatu archipelago.

Most of us only knew about Vanuatu through documentaries or reports before this short film debuted. Culture and traditions were therefore relatively foreign to us. We initially spent a lot of the pre-production doing a lot of research about the many islands that make up Vanuatu. We therefore inquired about the fauna, flora, local traditions, etc.

Our primary goal was not to make a documentary film but to immerse ourselves in and draw inspiration from the many cultures that can be found in Vanuatu in order to create a whole new island and a people who would illustrate our history. Our main objective was that when the film was first viewed, the landscapes, the people, the atmosphere would allow the viewer to project themselves and discover or recognize the culture of


